Executive Summary

Background: In 2006, the southeast Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths Steering Committee developed the traffic safety mission and goals for the region in order to move toward zero deaths for traffic-related crashes.

Problem Statement: In 2006, there were 494 deaths on Minnesota roadways and 69 of these deaths occurred on southeast Minnesota roadways – an unacceptable number. Southeast Minnesota TZD includes partners from the 11-county area (Dodge, Fillmore, Freeborn, Goodhue, Houston, Mower, Olmsted, Rice, Steele, Wabasha and Winona) who work together to create initiatives and programs to reduce traffic fatalities.

A regional strategic plan was developed in order to identify goals and strategies to accomplish the mission. In 2011, the data was reviewed and two of the three subcommittee goals had been met as well as nearly attaining the overall fatality reduction goal. As a result, a new strategic plan and new goals were set, beginning in 2012.

Mission:

To move southeast Minnesota toward zero deaths on our roads using education, enforcement, engineering, and emergency medical and trauma services.

Goal 1 – Reduce Fatal and Serious Injuries

To continuously decrease traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries in southeast Minnesota from the past **5-year averages** (2011-2016) of 44 fatalities and 135 serious injuries.

Objectives:

- A. To continuously increase regional seatbelt use rates.
 - As of April 2017, the seat belt compliance rate in southeast Minnesota was **90.3 percent**. As a region, our long-term goal is to achieve 100 percent usage rate. Our short-term goal is to see a continuous increase in the usage rate each year.
- B.<u>To examine the characteristics of the unbelted fatalities and serious injuries.</u> Calculation of seat belt use in fatal and serious crashes is possible with existing data. To continuously decrease the following:





Save your tailgate

A statewide seat belt enforcement campaign kicks off at Triton High School Friday night.

What: In honor of a classmate that was killed in an unbelted rollover crash last December, Triton SADD students, law enforcement and Toward Zero Deaths traffic safety stakeholders will be encouraging seat belt use by handing out *Buckle Up* bracelets. In addition, the Minnesota State Patrol will be using a t-shirt cannon to shoot "Buckle Up" t-shirts into the stands.

When: Half-time at varsity football game, Friday, Oct. 14, 2016 - game begins at 6 p.m.

Where: Triton High School Football Field Hwy St. West, 813 County Rd 34 Dodge Center, MN 55927

Who: Triton High School SADD students and staff have teamed up Southeast Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths and the Minnesota State Patrol to spread the word about the importance of buckling up.

Why: Lack of seat belt use is a contributing factor in nearly half of Minnesota fatalities.

- In 2015, 91 unbelted motorists lost their lives on Minnesota roads.
- In a five year period (2011 2015), 38 percent of the 1,379 people killed while riding in motor vehicles were not wearing seat belts.
- In 2015, 77 percent of vehicle occupants who were ejected or partially ejected and died were not wearing a seat belt.

The southeast Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths program brings area law enforcement, public health educators, engineers and emergency medical and trauma services together to reduce the number of traffic fatalities and severe injuries to zero in southeast Minnesota. The 11-county area encompasses: Dodge, Fillmore, Freeborn, Goodhue, Houston, Mower, Olmsted, Rice, Steele, Wabasha and Winona counties.







Regional Activities – Seat Belt Mobilization "Saved by the Belt" News Conference Oct. 19, 2016

On Sept. 5, 2015, Logan Sterling Meyers, 13, of Kenyon, and his grandfather, Sterling Sibley, of Kenyon, were involved in a crash when their pickup truck was struck by another that failed to stop at a stop sign.

The incident occurred on a drizzly morning at the intersection of Highway 246 and County Road 1 in Dundas when the two were on their way to McDonald's in Northfield. After their truck was struck, they were thrown off the roadway and into the ditch.

Representatives from the Rice County Sheriff's Office, the Northfield Police Department and the

Minnesota State Patrol honored Meyers and Sibley on Oct. 19, 2016 with the "Saved by the Belt Award," as their seat belt usage saved their lives.

ROCHESTER, Minn. – The Dodge County Independent newspaper of Kasson received the Media Star Award at the statewide Toward Zero Deaths conference Nov. 16-17 in Duluth for its efforts to raise awareness about traffic safety. Owner Rick Bussler accepted the award on the organization's behalf.

Star awards recognize individuals or organizations in Minnesota that show excellence in TZD's emphasis areas of enforcement, emergency medical and trauma services, education, engineering child passenger safety and judicial/court systems. Recipients have shown leadership and commitment in efforts to improve traffic safety throughout the state and build partnerships with others in the field.

The newspaper published front page stories and weekly columns on traffic safety and TZD efforts. Their stories ranged from seat belt kick off events to how fatal and serious injury crashes affect law enforcement, EMS and those close to the people involved.

Regional Activities – Seat Belt Survey (April 2017)

The seat belt efforts focused this past year on educational activities, such as partnering with law enforcement on a regional level with the various mobilizations, as well as educating citizens in southeast Minnesota and state lawmakers. The rate has been trending upward and it is now 90.3 percent. Focus for the upcoming year will continue with educational efforts, combined with law enforcement mobilizations, educating parents through driver education and worksites throughout the region.


Regional Seat Belt Survey Results

The Southeast Minnesota TZD Steering committee wanted to show the regional trends in the area, and therefore, began collecting their regional data beginning in 2006, enlisting the help of DPS OTS evaluators to set up a scientifically significant survey. The 2006-2017 results are shown below. Southeast Minnesota seat belt compliance rate increased slightly from last year, showing a rate of 90.3 percent.

Local teen and regional Toward Zero Deaths partners encourage high school students to practice safe driving habits and speak up when others drive distracted

What: Student outreach events and news conference to launch statewide distracted driving education and extra enforcement campaign. Southeast Minnesota regional law enforcement, regional traffic safety stakeholders, MnDOT, Department of Public Safety and Mayo High School are joining forces to help stop distracted driving. Law enforcement in Southeast Minnesota and across the state will begin extra patrols targeting distracted driving beginning Monday and running through April 23.

In an effort to reach high school students, numerous schools (including Mayo High School) will be highlighting distracted driving this week to encourage teens to speak up when their peers are not paying attention behind the wheel.

Why: To save lives on Minnesota roads.

- Distracted driving is a leading factor in one of every four crashes on Minnesota roads.
- Statewide in the last five years (2011-2015) there were 219 fatalities and 852 serious injuries resulting from crashes involving a teen driver. Of these crashes, distraction contributed to 36 fatal and 194 serious injuries.

SPEAK UP: PUT THE PHONE DOWN

Local teen and regional Toward Zero Deaths partners encourage high school students to practice safe driving habits and speak up when others drive distracted

Rochester, Minn. — Reaching down for an item that fell on the floor, turning around to settle the kids down, and picking up the cell phone for an incoming call. They all seem harmless until a driver with their eyes off the road leads to a crash.

For the first time, law enforcement across the state is extending the extra enforcement period to two weeks to conduct overtime patrols for distractive driving. Beginning April 10, more than 300 law enforcement agencies across the state will participate. The campaign that runs through April 23 is coordinated by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety Office of Traffic Safety (DPS-OTS).

Southeast Minnesota regional law enforcement, regional traffic safety stakeholders, Minnesota Department of Transportation, Department of Public Safety and Mayo High School joined forces today at Mayo High School to announce the campaign that will hopefully change habits and save lives.

"In order to prevent another tragedy, Mayo High School is committed to educating our students on the dangers of distracted driving," said Officer Pat Kelly, Mayo High School Police Liaison Officer. "Our goal is to encourage teens to speak up when others are not paying attention behind the wheel. Offer to be a designated texter or tell the driver it can wait. Speaking up could ultimately save your life or the lives of others on the road"

Too Many Lives Lost

Too many people are not making driving the number one priority behind the wheel.

- More than 86,000 crashes were distracted driving-related from 2011 2015, contributing to one in four crashes in Minnesota.
- Distracted driving contributes to an average of 65 deaths and 215 life-changing injuries a year (2011 – 2015).
- During the 2015 distracted driving extra enforcement campaign, law enforcement cited 909 drivers for texting and driving, an 80 percent increase over the previous year.

Distracted Driving Behaviors

Posting on Facebook, checking that box score or Googling information on a device while driving are all against the law under Minnesota's "Use of Wireless Communications Device" statute, which is commonly referred to as the texting and driving law.

Distractions that could lead to a crash also include fiddling with controls for music, eating and drinking, children fighting or an adult passenger's behavior.

Distracted Driving Consequences

- With Minnesota's "No Texting" law, it's illegal for drivers to read, send texts and
 emails, and access the web while the vehicle is in motion or a part of traffic. That
 includes sitting at a stoplight or stop sign.
 - \$50 plus court fees for a first offense.
 - \$275 plus court fees for a second and/or subsequent offense.
- If you injure or kill someone because of texting and driving, you can face a felony charge of criminal vehicular operation or homicide.

Do Your Part and Join Minnesotans Driving Distracted-Free

- Cell phones Put the phone down, turn it off or place it out of reach.
- Music and other controls Pre-program radio stations and arrange music in an easy-to-access spot. Adjust mirrors and ventilation before traveling.
- Navigation Map out the destination and enter the GPS route in advance.
- Eating and drinking Avoid messy foods and secure drinks.
- Children Teach children the importance of good behavior in a vehicle and model proper driving behavior.
- Passengers Speak up to stop drivers from distracted driving behavior and offer to help with anything that takes the driver's attention off the road.

Distracted driving education is a component of Minnesota's core traffic safety effort, <u>Toward Zero Deaths (TZD)</u>. A primary vision of the TZD program is to create a safe driving culture in Minnesota in which motorists support a goal of zero road fatalities by practicing and promoting safe and smart driving behavior. TZD focuses on the application of four strategic areas to reduce crashes — education, enforcement, engineering, and emergency medical and trauma response.

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Regional Activities – Southeast Minnesota TZD Workshop May 3, 2017

The 13th annual Southeast Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths Workshop was held May 3, in Rochester. More than 200 traffic safety professionals attended, representing 11 counties. Personal impact speaker was Matt Maas. His son, Logan Maas, was an 18-year-old passenger in a vehicle that left the roadway and rolled into the ditch on Dec. 18, 2015. Logan, who was unbelted, was ejected from the vehicle. He died from his injuries. Matt and Dodge County Sheriff, Scott

The southeast Minnesota TZD initiative aims to create a collaborative, comprehensive, regional approach to reduce traffic deaths and severe injuries. As part of these efforts, an annual workshop is held to help facilitate the implementation of TZD in all southeast Minnesota communities. Encouraged to attend are law enforcement, engineers, educators, emergency medical services, local policymakers and other traffic safety advocates.

The workshop participants are surveyed annually and each year the survey respondents rate the workshop with high marks and urge the planning team to continue to have the workshop annually. Southeast Minnesota's Toward Zero Deaths workshop convenes to address traffic deaths Understanding teen behavior behind the wheel is among the topics on saving lives

What: Is one death acceptable on Minnesota highways? Southeast Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths workshop partners will discuss crash trends and determine best practices for reducing traffic deaths and serious injuries on southeast Minnesota roadways.

When: Wednesday, May 3, 2017, 8 a.m. - 3 p.m.

Where: International Event Center, 7333 Airport View Drive SW, Rochester

Why: Since TZD's inception in 2003, traffic-related deaths have declined by 40 percent. During the last 10 years (2006-2015), motor vehicle crashes were the leading cause of unintentional injury deaths for Minnesotans, ages five through 24.

Who: More than 200 regional traffic safety stakeholders will attend the Southeast Minnesota Regional TZD workshop. They represent law enforcement, engineering, education, emergency medical and trauma services as well as local leaders. The Minnesota Departments of Public Safety, Health and Transportation are hosting the workshop

Highlights:

9:15 a.m. – The Teenage Brain and Risk Reduction: Connecting the Dots – Erin Walsh, *Mind Positive Parenting*. Walsh connects the latest in brain science and risk-taking behaviors in adolescence as it relates to traffic-safety. Using stories, warmth and humor, she presents practical strategies for engaging young people in risk reduction, making it easy to apply this information with youth and families.

12:30 p.m. – Remembering Logan Maas – Dodge County Sheriff Scott Rose; Matt Maas, Logan's father. Logan Maas was an 18-year-old passenger in a vehicle that left the roadway and rolled into the ditch on December 18, 2015. Logan, who was unbelted, was ejected from the vehicle. He died from his injuries. Logan was a senior at Triton High school and was a proud volunteer firefighter for the Dodge Center Fire Department, alongside his father. Extra DWI Patrols Aug. 18 - Sept. 3

ROCHESTER, Minn. — Whether it's having fun on the boat or playing beach volleyball, it's easy for a person to lose track of how much they're drinking while out celebrating the final days of summer. It's easy to forget that driving home with a buzz is drunk driving.

As summer winds down, officers, deputies and troopers from more than 300 agencies statewide will be working overtime with funding provided by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The Minnesota Department of Public Safety Office of Traffic Safety (DPS-OTS) coordinates the extra enforcement and education effort which runs Aug. 18—Sept. 3.

As law enforcement kicks off the extra enforcement period, Angie Jarrett, Assistant Supervisor of Mayo Clinic Medical Transport and Plainview EMS, is speaking out as a reminder to make good choices when celebrating the upcoming Labor Day holiday.

"As family and friends mourn the loss of their loved ones following a tragic crash, first responders often feel the emotional impact of removing the dead and injured from the wreckage." said Angie Jarrett . "Don't be afraid to speak up. Take the keys away from a friend or loved one, and find them a sober ride home. It could save a life, even yours."

Drivers Heeding the Warnings:

Preliminary numbers show there were 73 drunk driving-related fatalities last year compared with 95 in 2015, a 22 percent decrease.

"Learning from past mistakes is crucial. Unfortunately, too many drivers didn't line up a sober ride during the last DWI Extra Enforcement period as more than 2,400 motorists statewide were arrested," said Wabasha County Sheriff Rodney Bartsh. "This enforcement period, we have confidence that people will make the right choice. A night in jail, losing your license or causing a fatal crash because you didn't plan ahead is not worth it. Call a friend or loved one to get you home safely before it's too late."

Impaired Driving News Release p. 2

DWI Consequences:

- Loss of license for up to a year, thousands of dollars in costs and possible jail time.
- Repeat DWI offenders, as well as first-time offenders arrested at 0.16 and above alcohol-concentration level, must use ignition interlock in order to regain legal driving privileges or face at least one year without a driver's license.
- Offenders with three or more offenses are required to use interlock for three to six years, or they will never regain driving privileges.

Commit to a Sober Ride:

- Plan for a safe ride designate a sober driver, use a cab/public transportation, or stay at the location of the celebration.
- Speak up Offer to be a designated driver or be available to pick up a loved one
 anytime, anywhere. If you see an impaired person about to get behind the
 wheel, get them a safe ride home.
- Buckle up the best defense against a drunk driver.
- Report drunk driving call 911 when witnessing impaired driving behavior. Be prepared to provide location, license plate number and observed dangerous behavior.

The enhanced DWI enforcement campaign is a component of the state's <u>Toward Zero</u> <u>Deaths (TZD)</u> program. A primary vision of the TZD program is to create a safe driving culture in Minnesota in which motorists support a goal of zero road fatalities by practicing and promoting safe and smart driving behavior. TZD focuses on the application of four strategic areas to reduce crashes – education, enforcement, engineering, and emergency medical and trauma response.

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Regional Activities – Mass Casualty Training Exercise Aug. 24, 2017

Dodge County Emergency
Management and the Dodge
County Sheriff's Office
hosted the largest mass casualty
training exercise in county
history. Law enforcement
agencies, fire departments and
ambulance services from the
region, as well as Mayo One,



took part in the exercise. The mock scenario was a crash involving an overturned school bus full of students and a minivan. Volunteers played the role of victims inside the vehicles. First responders had to work together to free them, tend to their simulated wounds and transport them to a mock hospital. Many school and transportation officials from the area watched the exercise to evaluate how they should incorporate mass casualty response into their plans. KIMT-TV, KIMT-TV, KAAL-TV, Dodge County Independent and the Rochester Post Bulletin had excellent coverage of the event! See pages 68-70 for media coverage.

Regional Activities – TZD Sign Placement Year-long activity

Many southeast agencies have demonstrated their commitment to the Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths program by replacing existing "Safe & Sober" signs with updated TZD Buckle Up signs. Using these partnerships to further implement traffic safety, the TZD campaign is able to reach out to the 5th "E"— *Everyone*. By spreading public awareness, partnerships are able to encourage culture change. Guidelines regarding sign placement were established and distributed with the signs.





Guideline for placement of TZD signs (replacing old Safe & Sober signs):

The new 2017 TZD signs will replace existing "Safe & Sober" signs that were placed across the state many years ago. These are not standard highway signs. They are designed for educational purposes and not to be placed on roads and highways. If placed on roads and highways, these signs would not be compliant with the standards in the Minnesota Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD).

According to the MN MUTCD, signs should be individually installed on separate posts or mountings. For parking areas where signs have been placed under STOP signs, it is recommended to mount the TZD sign on a separate post next to the STOP sign or move the TZD sign to a new location within the parking area. Signs should be mounted so that they do not block the driver's view of approaching traffic or another traffic control device such as a sign or traffic signal.



Due to the initial limited amount of replacement signs, requestors will need to provide the specific location of the sign that is to be replaced and where the

new sign will be located, so they can be tracked.

Background

As part of the Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths (TZD) program, changing traffic safety culture is critical to reducing fatal and serious injuries on Minnesota roadways. The number of deaths has not significantly reduced during the past five years. To create a culture where even one death is unacceptable, the TZD program wants to create a culture that is engrained throughout Minnesota communities, by instilling positive values and beliefs about traffic safety.

All roadway users, including those who build, repair and maintain the roadways, can be part of the goal of zero deaths. There are an average of 200 active



work zones throughout the construction season. A work zone is defined as any area where highway construction, maintenance or utility work is being done.

Each year in Minnesota, an average of seven people die in work zone crashes and 753 fatal or serious injury crashes occur.

Purpose

TZD hard hat stickers are designed for workers to wear as they work to maintain and build Minnesota roadways. The stickers can be worn to illustrate a commitment to the TZD goal of reducing death and serious injuries on all roadways. They also reiterate the TZD commitment to keeping workers safe.

Next steps

MnDOT construction/field personnel statewide will receive these free stickers through the Construction Managers Group. Stickers are also available through the Districts' resident engineers and the TZD regional coordinators. Contractors and other workers are also encouraged to wear the stickers.

Region Goal 2 – TZD Partnership Goals Regional Activities – Engineering

Low cost, high benefit engineering safety improvements continue on both state and local roadways. The district and each county are implementing safety plans to further reduce crashes. Although many factors affect traffic-related fatalities — including the economy, driver behavior and weather — the fact remains that many traffic safety professionals continue to look at proactive and systematic ways to reduce fatalities and serious injuries due to crashes.



County engineers continue to implement safety projects that were identified in the

county highway safety plans. District 6 county engineers are collaborating and applying for Highway Safety Improvement Program grants together to make roadway improvements proactively and systematically. The direction was to identify low cost, high benefit safety initiatives, e.g. rumble strips/rumble stripes, curve delineation, improved edge lines, intersection lighting and intersection signing improvements on the county system.


EMS Regional Conference – eighth year of participation

This relationship continues to grow as the regional TZD coordinator has been participating in the Regional Trauma Advisory Committee's Education Outreach subcommittee.









Mission

To move southeast Minnesota toward zero deaths on our roads using education, enforcement, engineering, and emergency medical and trauma services.

Goal 1 - Reduce TZD Fatality and Serious Injuries

To continuously decrease traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries in southeast Minnesota from the past 5year averages (2012-2016*) of 44 fatalities and 135 serious injuries. Note: New injury definitions were introduced in 2016 and may have contributed to a higher reported number of serious injuries.

Objectives:

A. To continuously increase regional seatbelt use rates.

(ABC 6 News) -- The Minnesota State Patrol visited the Triton High School football game Friday night to remind everyone to buckle up.

Toward Zero Deaths is starting its fall "Click It or Ticket" campaign to encourage drivers to wear seatbelts. The State Patrol launched t-shirts into the crowd using a t-shirt cannon to spread the message.

And the message hit close to home. Logan Maas, a senior at Triton High School, died when he was ejected from a car during a crash late last year.

"I think it's a little more impactful for the locals here because they just think of the loss of a community person who was involved in the school here," Sgt. Troy Christianson said. "And with that, it's just important that we keep educating and make sure people are aware of the important of wearing your seatbelt."

In 2015, 91 people who were killed in crashes on Minnesota roads were not wearing a seatbelt at the time.

On Sept. 5, 2015, Logan Sterling Meyers, 13, of Kenyon, and his grandfather, Sterling Sibley, of Kenyon, were involved in a crash when their pickup truck was struck by another that failed to stop at a stop sign.

On Thursday morning, Meyers and Sibley returned to the scene of that crash, but under happier circumstances. Representatives from the Rice County Sheriff's Office, the Northfield Police Department and the Minnesota State Patrol honored Meyers and Sibley on Thursday morning with the "Saved by the Belt Award," as their seat belt usage saved their lives.

The incident occurred on a drizzly morning at the intersection of Hwy. 246 and County Road 1 in Dundas when the two were on their way to McDonald's in Northfield. After their truck was struck, they were thrown off the roadway and into the ditch.

All of the occupants of the crash, including an unidentified male in the other vehicle, were transported to Northfield Hospital, but the unidentified male was then transported to a metro hospital with more serious injuries as he was ejected from the vehicle in the crash.

The difference, said Rice County Sheriff Troy Dunn, was simple.

"It's a tale of two stories," he said. "Both vehicles were totaled. These two walked away and one was taken to a metro hospital and was seriously injured because he wasn't wearing a seat belt."

In recalling the event, Sibley noted that it was drizzling slightly.

"We were coming down the hill, and all of a sudden there was a white streak, a white pickup, and I didn't have time to do anything," he said. "He never even slowed down. We heard a crash and the next thing we knew, we were crawling out."

For Sibley and Meyers, their takeaways from the incident were alike.

"Makes you a believer in the seat belt for sure," said Sibley. "I cannot imagine if either one of us would have stayed in the cab if it wasn't for it. Especially [Meyers], he came flying at me and the seat belt caught him." Meyers is an eighth grader at Kenyon-Wanamingo Middle/High School in Kenyon. He plays middle linebacker and four-back for the seventh- and eighth-grade football team and also participates in K-W's renowned wrestling program in the winter. In the spring, he competes for the trap shooting team.

While still three years away from his own driver's license, Meyers had some advice for both motorists and passengers.

"Wear it," he said of seat belt usage. "It's small, but it saves your life."

For having the wherewithal to use their seat belts, Meyers and Sterling received plaques that read, "Saved by the Belt Award."

"We are rewarding these people for doing the right thing," said Dunn. "These people are living examples of what the seat belt does for you. People see these pictures and it might be the thing that makes them put on their seat belt."

For Dunn and Northfield Police Sgt. Kevin Tussing, a two-pronged attack of education and enforcement appears to be the only way in which they can get Rice County motorists to wear seat belts.

"We would love not to have to issue any tickets, but it's shown over the years that education doesn't work by itself," he said. "Officers by ourselves have to be a part of the enforcement piece. Maybe giving out a ticket will help them learn."

Tussing is the Rice County director of the Toward Zero Deaths initiative, which uses grant money to pay for extra enforcement shifts for officers who are targeting offenders in particular areas like DWI, speed, "move over" laws and, like this month, seat belt usage.

Through Oct. 30, extra patrols will be on Rice County roads looking for seat belt offenders. Seat belt offenses will cost motorists \$105 in Rice County.

"I want them to think, 'where can I spend that \$105 better than when I don't have my seatbelt on?'," said Dunn. "Hopefully something will click with that person to wear their seat belt."

Students also listened as law enforcement urged them that texting and driving of any kind is against the law and not worth the possible danger.

However, the most effective speech came from that of Grace Riley. The Mayo High School Senior addressed her peers about losing her cousin Deej Logan in 2012. Deej was driving to her first day of senior year of high school when she crashed into the back of a bus. It was discovered she had been trying to text at the time. Grace Riley urged her friends and fellow students to not make the same choice.

"I challenge you to put your phone down because no text is that important," Grace said.

Extra distracted driving enforcement has begun statewide and will last until April 23rd. Law enforcement also says that it's not just texting, but also eating, and fooling with the radio or navigation can also cause distracted driving related accidents.

The fight against distracted driving in Minnesota began Monday at Mayo High School.

More than 300 agencies statewide are cracking down on distracted driving over the next two weeks, in an effort to drop the death count to zero.

Grace Riley, speaking about her cousin Deej Logan, said, "For me, I have all these precious memories of her, but for many of you, she's just a number on a piece of paper because she chose to drive distracted."

Deaths from distracted driving have affected many families across Minnesota, including the loved ones of Logan.

Nearly five years ago, the Byron High School student was killed on the first day of school when she crashed the minivan she was driving into the back of a school bus. She was texting when it happened.

"Texting and driving is all too common today, you might think you're able to do it without hurting yourself or hurting others, but it only takes one time and it happens in a split second. That day, Deej made a deadly decision to pick up her phone and start to type a message that never even sent," said Riley.

Logan's family is not alone. In the age of smartphones, the number of cases of distracted driving has increased dramatically.

"We see a lot of texting and driving, Snapchat, Facebook accessing while people are driving, so we're encouraging teens today to actually help us with that endeavor and stop distractions," said Statewide Toward Zero Deaths coordinator Kristine Hernandez.

Not only is distracted driving dangerous, it's illegal in Minnesota to text, email, or use the internet on a smartphone while operating a motor vehicle, even at stoplights or stop signs. Make the right choice, and put your phone down.

"Nobody wants to hear that they've lost a loved one through something that's totally preventable, and that's what we say, it's a crash, not an accident, because it can be prevented. People make bad choices and that's how they end up in a crash, whether they're going too fast, not wearing a seatbelt, driving distracted, drinking and driving," said Hernandez.

We can all do our part to make sure the distracted driving death count in Minnesota drops to zero, and stays there.

392 people lost their lives in the state of Minnesota in 2016 due to distracted driving. Officials hope to decrease that number to 300 or fewer by 2020, then ultimately to zero deaths from distracted driving in the future.

ABC 6 News)--Law enforcement is taking extra measures to get drivers to put the phone, food and the make-up down.

Starting Monday, you'll see more police, troopers and deputies on Minnesota roads. Distracted drivers who are caught may find themselves getting something other than just a ticket.

In an effort to end distracted driving, AAA is giving law enforcement a new device to hand out called CELLslip.

"What they do is they get in the car, they set their phone down and all of a sudden they start hearing the pings and the rings and unfortunately they can't seem to ignore those until they get to their next stop," said AAA spokesperson Gail Weinholzer

"It blocks the signal that you're cell phone receives and it'll block incoming calls, text messages, and media notification," said Olmsted County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Jens Dammen.

Dammen said CELLslip is a great product that can take away one form of distracted driving, but he said sometimes it's hard for law enforcement to figure out what the distraction is for the driver.

"Maybe they're eating while they're driving; maybe they're looking for their new cd to put in their cd player or maybe a pet on their lap. You see a wide variety of things that cause distractions," said Dammen.

One place Dammen said he sees a lot of people on their phones: stoplights. He said nobody intends to actually drive distracted.

"It's something that happens in a moment. You might get away with it for 100 times, but that 101st time it might be the time it leads to a car accident," said Dammen.

Olmsted County has 1,500 CELLslips. AAA donated 500 and the rest were purchased by the Rochester Police Benevolent Association and Olmsted County Deputy Sheriff's Office Association.

Distracted driving extra enforcement runs statewide April 10-23.

Father of Triton Senior Killed in 2015 Crash Shares Heartbreaking Message

(ABC 6 News)-- More than 200 regional law enforcement, emergency responders and local leaders are in Rochester learning about crashes and how to reduce the number of deaths and injuries on southeast Minnesota roads.

Beyond the statistics and tips, is the heartbreak of losing a loved one from something that could have been avoided.

Nearly 17 months ago, a crash involving four teenagers rocked Dodge County. Dodge County Sheriff Scott Rose is no stranger to tough calls, but on the night of December 18, 2015, he received one of the toughest of his career.

"I answered him and I could tell right away that the deputy was upset, he said, 'Scott, it's Matt's kid, it's Logan, it's Logan Maas, he's dead, Scott'," said Sheriff Rose.

Triton High School senior and Dodge Center Volunteer Firefighter Logan Maas was killed when he was thrown from a car that rolled into a ditch in rural Dodge County. It was Sheriff Rose's job to tell his good friend that his son had died.

"Having to be the one to notify Matt, Julie and their daughter Mariah in the Apache Mall parking lot that their son and brother Logan died in a car crash is one of the toughest things I've ever had to do as Sheriff," said Sheriff Rose.

"To hear my wife crying 'no,' to have her ask 'where is Logan now?, I wanna go see him, I wanna make sure he's okay.' Tell her that's not the last memory you want of Logan, you don't want to go see him like that," said Logan's father, Matt.

Logan's dad said it shocked and saddened him to learn that his own son, who demanded his passengers wear a seatbelt, made the decision to not buckle up when he was in the back seat of the car.

"Had he been wearing his seatbelt, I wouldn't be in front of you today; he would have survived that crash," said Maas.

Matt wants others to understand what his family is going through so they will never have to experience the same heartache and grief.

"Having my daughter ask me 'How can this be dad? It has always been the five of us.' How do you look at your daughter when she asks you that and say it's going to be okay, it's not going to be okay. This feeling we've got in the pit of our stomach right now, it's going to stay for the rest of our life," said Maas.

In the past four years, traffic deaths have gone down by 40%. According to, Minnesota Department of Public Safety, between 2006 and 2015, motor vehicle crashes were the leading cause of unintentional injury deaths for Minnesotans ages 5 to 24.

ROCHESTER, Minn. - It's a decision a local father has to wrap his head around for the rest of his life: why did his 18 year-old son Logan not wear his seat belt?

In December of 2015, Logan Maas was traveling in a vehicle in Dodge County when the car lost control and he was tossed from it. Logan died at the scene. Now his father Matt is talking to members of law enforcement, construction crews, and other transportation officials about how important their job is in getting the number of road deaths down to zero in the state.

Matt wants people to keep getting the message out there to be safe on roads, and especially to wear your seat belt. He says he never wants others to feel what his family is feeling.

"It's like getting kicked in the gut every day you wake up. It's a nightmare you don't get to leave. You don't get to walk away from it. It's there and it's an absolute nightmare."

Shannon Stemcha, Isiah's mom said she's extremely proud of all three of the boys for their efforts and impact, "The first time I watched it, it gave me chills and I never would've imagined that it would evolve into something so big."

In 2016, more than 300 people died on Minnesota roadways as a result of not buckling up. According to the Minnesota Department of Transportation, each year distracted driving accounts for 1 in every 4 accidents.

"So far this year, we've actually had seventy-nine people die from not being belted in their vehicle," expressed Sgt. Troy Christianson.

Numbers, Christianson said are simply too high; stressing the importance of collaboration in an effort to prevent such tragedies from ever occurring.



(ABC 6 News) -- First responders from numerous Dodge County agencies participated in a mock emergency drill Thursday, testing their reactions to a staged multiple-death crash.

Crews met at the Dodge County Fairgrounds in Kasson to respond to the simulated school bus crash, practicing how to prioritize their responses and communicate between a number of different agencies.

"The exercise is meant to be a training exercise so they understand how to respond to something like that with limited resources and make sure we're getting everyone the care they need in the proper time we need and the proper communication that we need," Dodge County Emergency Management Director Matt Maas said. Behind the scenes, dispatchers worked to get help where it was needed most and call in backup.

The "victims" also said they got a lot out of the experience, especially watching firefighters cut open part of the school bus.

"I think they responded very well to the injuries," Chris Lannin said. "They came around and assessed, they gave you a color based on how intense your injuries were, and it went really well."

The goal is to be as ready as possible for the real thing if and when disaster strikes.

KASSON, Minn. (KTTC) - An overturned school bus, wrecked van, and dozens of first responders -- all part of a hectic scene at the Dodge County Fairgrounds Thursday afternoon. But it was by design.

Dodge County Emergency Management and the Dodge County Sheriff's Office hosted the largest mass casualty training exercise in county history, which ran from about 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Law enforcement agencies, fire departments and ambulance services from throughout Dodge County -- as well as the Mayo One helicopter-- took part in the exercise. The mock scenario was a wreck involving a school bus full of students and a minimum.

Actors played the role of victims inside the vehicles. First responders had to work together to free them, tend to their simulated wounds, and transport them to a mock hospital.

"What's really unique is getting all the public safety groups working together on the exact same exercise," said Dodge County Emergency Management Director Matt Maas. "There are multiple fire departments here from throughout the county, multiple ambulance services, multiple law enforcement jurisdictions. Getting all of them to work together on the same thing, along with engaging public health in the exercise and managing family reunification centers, family assistance centers, to manage an incident of this size and getting the information to loved ones and family members as quick as they can."

School and transportation officials were watching the exercise to see how they can incorporate a mass casualty response into their plans. Evaluators were also on hand to assess the first responders' performance.

KASSON, Minn. - It's a sight we don't see every day and that's a good thing. Around 30 people volunteered to be victims on Thursday for a mass casualty training exercise. While you always hope you'll never be in an emergency situation, many found comfort seeing that their local first responders will be ready to handle it.

All Dodge County Emergency Response, Law Enforcement agencies, and fire department crews participated in the training which is the largest of its kind in the region.

Because they wanted to keep it as realistic as possible, none of the crews responders had any idea what the scenario would be until they arrived on scene. The simulation involved an overturned school bus, minivan and multiple victims with a wide range of injuries.

We talked to one of the volunteer victims who jumped at the opportunity to help out. "The training is always awesome," says Terri Flicek. "It gives you a chance to do the real thing and I wanted to give them a chance because I'm wanting to become a firefighter and EMS."

Mayo One landed on the scene multiple times, their crew members did some training of their own during the event.
